In 2023 KIDS Foundation celebrated 30 years, we rewound time to reflect on significant events and the beautiful friendships we created. We came to the realisation that over the 30 years we had come into the lives of more than a million families through our recovery and education programs, making difference.

We played old videos, some in DVD format, went through photo albums before phones captured and saved images. The images and videos shared stories of the most inspiring, courageous and extraordinary young people who through tragedy had their lives changed forever.

Our education programs initiated in 1993 from the original 'Adopt a Grandbuddy', an intergenerational reverse mentoring program. Unlike other early learning programs at the time, it empowered children to have agency in their learning. That program has continued to evolve and regularly features in media stories today. SeeMore Safety was created in the early 2000's, with the SeeMore Safety doll co-designed in 2006 by the great Tony Barber. Fourteen storybook titles have followed, with the release of a new book expected in 2024. We had our biggest printing and distribution run of 465,000 children's books in 2020, Another title 'SeeMore Bug Safety - The tiny germs we can't see' written in 2019 to help children understand the pandemic, saw 4,000 copies printed in 4 languages other than English.

We are proud to be working together with education and health sectors, like-minded organisations, and partners across Australia to give children the greatest possible outcomes to thrive. We do this through empowerment, education, innovation, research, and advocacy programs.

We will continue to evolve, inspire innovation, and to be a strong leader so we can achieve our vision that 'every child is free of harm and injury' and given the best chance of a happy, healthy and safe life.





A Message...

2023 was a truly rewarding year for the KIDS Foundation and our people. We celebrated 30 years of greatness, cherished memories, remarkable moments, and reached outstanding milestones. It was a record-breaking year for fundraising, with a 20% increase in revenue. This allowed us to expand our recovery programs, camps, career enhancing experiences, and equine therapy plans. We were also able to invest more in our most in-demand education programs and services.

One of our notable accomplishments was the creation of Tour d'Horse, a race at a walking pace. In its first year, this event raised \$520,000. These funds will enable us to reach 200,000 children across Australia this year and make a significant impact on the lives of retired racehorses.

We are excited to introduce a new initiative called YABI (Young Advisory Board Influencers). This idea brings together future leaders through a young advisory group. The concept is based on a reverse mentoring model, where young influencers work with KIDS board members to create mutually benefiting, unique opportunities that will be instrumental in influencing outcomes that make real transformation.

Our commitment to improving the lives of children and young people affected by injury and trauma

remains steadfast. We continue to provide opportunities that build bright prospects, resilience, and optimism.

Through our program 'SeeMore Safety,' we give children agency in their learning to empower healthy physical and mental wellbeing outcomes in a way that 'let kids be kids'.

We gratefully acknowledge the devoted, driven, committed, and loyal KIDS team, Board of Directors, Ambassadors, and volunteers who share our vision of creating a safe environment for every child, to be free from harm and injury.

We hope you enjoy reading the extraordinary and magical stories shared in this report.

Through the SeeMore Safety program children are empowered to take agency in their learning to gain understanding of their physical and emotional capabilities, so that they can be happy, healthy and keep themselves safe.

What We Do

TIC - Trauma and Injury Care

Our TIC programs support children and grownups who have been differently abled following horrific trauma and injuries caused from burns, accidents, dog attacks, crime, neglect, abuse, illness, disease and environmental events.

We recognise the positive impact of peer support that is promoted through our camps, leadership workshops and the National Burn Survivors' Network for families.

Physical and Emotional Wellbeing

Through our recovery and education programs we are committed to promoting physical and emotional wellbeing.

We continue to provide healthy lifestyle opportunities and sessions. Individualised support is afforded to those when needed through counselling, providing equipment, mobility devices, education and financial resources.

Child Safety

KIDS Foundation is a not-for-profit charity established

in 1993 to support traumatised and injured children

and grown-ups.

In 2020, our SeeMore Safety program reached 400,000 children through 10,000 kindergartens and preschools with an integrated approach to safety, physical and emotional wellbeing.

KIDS Foundation is committed to early intervention, creating, and instilling a health and safety culture that gives young people agency in their learning, critical for lifelong wellbeing, autonomy and happiness.



Education

Ready To Go SeeMore Program

'Ready to Go SeeMore' is a safety education program proudly funded by The Flora and Frank Leith Charitable Trust. The program was delivered to 25 groups in 25 services across Ballarat, Geelong and Bendigo, and reached approx 750 children. It was designed to prepare children in the year prior to school to be emotionally and physically school ready. Data showed that

- · 88% of the services demonstrated an overall improved average in post assessment scores
- 100% of survey responses from educators reflected that they enjoyed the program
- 450 assessments were undertaken by staff
- 219 children engaged in both pre and post assessments
- 765 books were sent home with children

eSafety Program

Our eSafety program and book, was proudly funded through the eSafety Commissioner's Online Safety Grants Program as a result of a Pilot Program funded by Newcastle Permanent Charitable Foundation (NPCF) in 2022/2023. It was aimed at teaching online safety to preschool children. The Program shares the importance of teaching children to use devices in shared zones around the home, setting time limits for online use and making sure adults maintain a dialogue around online safety.

Through 1,000 centres across Australia, 50,000 families have had tangible and free access to 'Netys the Trusted eSafety Friend' and SeeMore's programs that address the need to enhance online "safety risk intelligence".

These resources were spread throughout Australia in distribution of approximately;

- 400 NSW
- 200 VIC
- 200 OLD
- 200 spread across WA, SA, TAS, ACT and the NT. This distribution was based on population and number of centres.

26,000 children at 650 pre-schools across the Hunter, Central Coast, Mid-North Coast, Central West, New England and the Northern Rivers.

Data showed that...

- 90% of parents said they would continue to use or consider using the SeeMore Safety app in the future
- 100% of parents felt their child was safer online since engaging in the program
- 94.7% of services said they would continue to use the KIDS Foundation eSafety resources as part of their curriculum







CARHM Start and SeeMore Kindness Program

The CARHM Start Program has been delivered in: Ballarat and Bacchus Marsh and is proudly funded by Flora and Frank Leith Charitable Trust reaching 500 children.

Geelong is proudly funded by The City of Geelong's Healthy and Connected Communities Grant reaching 250 children.

The SeeMore Kindness Program, incorporating the CARHM Start program, has been delivered in:
North and West Dandenong, funded by The Andrews Foundation and reaching 180 children
Ballarat is funded by Ballarat Connected Communities reaching 250 children.

The programs are a wellbeing and school readiness early intervention program that supports the physical and emotional health and safety of children and prepares them for their transition into school life. CARHM Start is an extension of our Ready To Go SeeMore program, focusing on the social, physical and emotional health and safety of children.

The project takes a holistic approach, stimulating positive action towards laying a solid foundation for the health, happiness, physical and emotional

wellbeing of children. The program aims to reduce emotional and physical health problems in young children by introducing appropriate interventions at an age when foundations for learning, health and behaviour throughout life are laid.

The first round of testing for this program was completed in early 2024. Results and the final testing round will be completed in September through to November in 2024.





Visiting Kinders with our miniature ponies

Our new program, off the back of Tour d'Horse, started in early 2024 and is proudly sponsored by PetStock and RB Sellars. The program involves educators from KIDS Foundation, along with an equine specialist, taking our ponies Carm and Eleven Eleven into kindergartens. This allows children to learn a little about horses and how they (the children) can interact and remain safe in their presence.

So far.....

- We've visited 13 centres in Ballarat, Bacchus Marsh as well as Geelong.
- 23 class groups have been a part of our program
- Approximately 1200 children have pet, brushed, and learnt all about Carm and Eleven Eleven and have hopefully started to develop an awareness of emotional connection.

The feedback from educators and families who have been involved with the program has been overwhelmingly positive, with many requesting additional visits next year. There has also been great interest in this program stemming from our story on Sunrise and other media stories, and also from word of mouth within the community and also amongst educators.







Events

2023 Noosa Triathlon

The 2023 Noosa tri saw the KIDS foundation field a team of 40 athletes which included 3 teams.

Athletes gathered Saturday afternoon at the RACV Noosa resort for a briefing and welcome from Susie, Nick and Beau, with a special guest KIDS ambassador, Craig Alexander (Crowie) who let every athlete know that they should finish the bike leg in under an hour. Athletes heard first-hand how the KIDS Foundation supported survivors and the personal growth in wellbeing and health thanks to the support of the foundation. Matt Thiele and Kel Keir shared their current achievements and their positive outlook which they credit to the community and years of attending KIDS Foundation camps and events.

Matt Thiele and Kel Keir were a great help in the event expo. Speaking with athletes and the public about the KIDS Foundation, selling waterbottles, frisbees and drumming up sales of our 2024 Lucky Spot. Kel won the lucky spot and gifted it forward to an athlete who missed out on the 2023 event.

This year with 40 active athletes, we raised over \$117,000 thanks to the team effort of Harris Trade plumbing \$45,000 and the individual athletes raising a combined \$72,000. A Special mention needs to go to the ten athletes that raised over \$2000 with an extra special mention to individuals that raised \$9500 - Leah Covell, \$5500 Matt Howarth and \$3700 Simone Joyner. \$3707 for their fundraising efforts. Sponsorship from Harris Trade Plumbing Suppiles,

Metrics and Rethink investing also assisted in reaching this target, which put KIDS Foundation to the top of the minor Charities for fundraising in 2023.

The athletic results from the competitors in the KIDS team were outstanding. The first charity superstar female was Jamie Orr, with Rose skipper coming in 3rd. Brent McKinnon represented the males achieving a 3rd for the charity superstar males.

Athletes were presented with their charity superstar medal by Crowie at Charity Park at the conclusion of the race.

2024 will see the team 50 strong with more athletes representing Harris Trade Plumbing Supplies, Metrics, the All Sorts and a couple of new faces we are excited to meet.

2024 Tour d'Horse

In January 2024, KIDS Foundation created an extraordinary fundraising initiative, 'Tour d'Horse', that surpassed all expectations by raising an astounding \$519,600, in its first year. The money raised supports children and grown-ups who have suffered severe trauma and will enable the delivery of educational resources to less fortunate children, while also highlighting the remarkable talents of off-track racehorses in a new role.

The tour took place over 10 days from Pokolbin to Tamworth, ending at the Toyota Tamworth Music Festival Parade. Riders took on an endurance challenge, riding 200 kms at walking pace. The 17 teams were made up of; The Victorian Racing Club, Godolphin Lifetime Care, Petstock, Magic Millions, The MRC Foundation, Emirates Park, Sam & Anthony Freedman, Michael Freedman, Banter Toys, RB Sellars, Team Thiele, Paradice Investment Property Group, Harris Plumbing, Greg Eurell Racing, Mackas Australian Black Angus Beef, Harwood Grains, Hunter Valley Operations and MJ Payne Racing. Celebrities included the likes of World Champion Ironman

Craig Alexander, ex Rugby Player John Minto, Award winning film director Simon Wincer and Actress Rachel Griffiths AM.

We are deeply grateful to the Hunter Valley community for their unwavering support in bringing Tour d'Horse to life. Special thanks to local legends Brian Atfield, Anto White, Ross Greenwood, and John Wade for their invaluable contributions and knowledge that influenced the success of the event. Their dedication has been instrumental in helping us achieve our fundraising goals and shining a spotlight on the incredible bond between humans and horses.

At the heart of our mission and what drove the event is the belief that every child deserves a chance to be safe free from harm and injury, and sadly if injured, usually under the most traumatic circumstances, heal and thrive.

Eleven Eleven

To many, Eleven Eleven or 11:11 has a special meaning. Some believe it influences our path and embraces a meaningful moment in time for an event to occur. To others, it's a sign of spiritual influence, an "angel number", that signals guidance, a sign to manifest your dreams or make a wish. For KIDS, Eleven Eleven has significant meaning and connection. Especially for our CEO, Susie.

After the success of Tour d'Horse 2024, we decide to search for a retired racehorse to be a KIDS Equine Ambassador who could lead future Tour d'Horse races. We heard about a horse that was coming off the track, famous for winning the Magic Millions Cup 3 times. The trainer was happy to gift him to the KIDS Foundation to be rehomed at Belltrees in the Hunter Valley. His name was Eleven Eleven. We knew he was the one. It happened to be the time that Bella, Susie's granddaughter, passed away. Susie connected with horses at the time to help with the loss, latwr introducing horses into the KIDS recovery and education programs. Eleven Eleven is now playing a major role in our education and equine recovery programs for trauma and injury survivors.



Nellie and Ellie

Eleven, Eleven appears in KIDS life in many ways like the two 11 year olds, Nellie and Ellie. They were the youngest riders on Tour d'Horse. They not only took on the challenge of riding 200km but also the fundraising. Fundraising at any age is daunting, however these two pocket rockets took it in their stride, raising an amazing \$58,000 between them.

Nellie and Ellie, were sponsored by Banter Toys, their horses named Pokémon Bella and Pokémon Belle reflecting characters from the Pokémon series. Riding Pokémon Bella was significant to Nellie as she rode in honour of her baby sister Bella who passed away on May 18, 2021, at 11.11. Ellie was inspired by the survivor's she had met at the KIDS Foundation camps. They formed a special bond with their horses and a friendship filled with memories they will hold dearly in their hearts forever.



Young girl who lost arm in school bus crash 'feels like a normal kid' again

A 10-year-old girl who lost her arm in a horrific school bus crash west of Melbourne earlier this year says she "feels like a normal kid" again.

Awheata was among 10 kids who were taken to hospital with serious injuries after their bus crashed while they were heading home from Exford Primary School on May 17.

There were 45 children on the bus when it rolled at the intersection of Exford Road and Murphys Road at

Awheata was sitting in the back of the bus with her siblings when it rolled.

Her injuries led to her left arm being amputated.

Together with her family, Awheata attended a trauma and recovery camp hosted by the Kids Foundation in Queensland.





Her dad Daniel Pikhari said the camp did wonders for his daughter's confidence.

"To sum up the camp into words is an understatement. It was something my family needed," he told Neil Mitchell on Nine radio station 3AW

"Being in an environment with parents who have had similar trauma has been amazing.

"This is the first time, this has happened to my family, and going up there and knowing the feelings I have, they are totally normal and are part of the process of the whole journey was uplifting."

Awheata said she was hesitant to get involved in the camp before she went due to her injuries.

But said it was great to "feel like a normal kid" again.

"We did lots of activities I thought I didn't want to do but my mum and dad said I needed to push (myself) forward," she said.

Awheata was also awarded the Extra Bright Star award for her efforts over the weekend.



Spotlight: Banter Toys



We were truly devastated to find all our computers, screens, cameras, hard drives, TVs, cash box and much more stolen. But there are some really lovely people that came to our rescue off the back of an interview with Neil Mitchell on Radio 3AW.

One of the superheroes was Garry Issac from Banter Toys. Garry heard our story on the radio and donated \$20,000 to help us re-equipe our workplace. Garry is one of the kindest and most special people I have ever come across.
