Spencer's Story

Spencer and his brother Fletcher came to KIDS Foundation after surviving a horrific and unspeakable revenge attack at the hands of their own father. At only 5 years of age Spencer suffered burns to 37 per cent of his body, including full thickness burns to his shoulders and neck. Spencer, now 15, doesn't let his burns hold him back.

KIDS Camps are a place where young people in the KIDS program can come together and share common understandings. Life skill sessions form a part of each camp itinerary, and participants complete vision boards or set goals to achieve in the coming year. Spencer is ambitious and has the desire and determination to achieve great things, and at KIDS we have a way of making dreams come true. Spencer's dream to become an actor was a little more complicated, *however...*

One of the volunteers at camp had told Spencer that a casting company had been advertising for burn survivors to play extras roles for an upcoming "blockbuster" movie. Spencer said he wanted to apply saying "I want to make my scars worthwhile". On his behalf, we contacted the casting company but sadly the positions had been filled. A few months later, our CEO Susie was on a health retreat sharing a house with a lovely lady named Leonie, who asked to read the book she had recently written. That night she stayed up reading. In the morning, she asked Susie about Spencer and Fletcher who featured.

Susie mentioned Spencer's desire to be in this particular movie. The following morning a gentleman named Rob approached her and said he would like to talk. He had been speaking to Leonie where she mentioned this young boy's dream to be in a movie. As it turned out, part of the

movie was being filmed on Rob's property and he was cast as an extra. Rob said he would give this role up for Spencer. KIDS didn't want him to do that, but we would be grateful to be introduced to someone from the casting company. They asked for three photos and his story. The casting company showed the information to the Director and after reading it, he asked Spencer to audition for a part. In the end, he ended up with a talking role in this blockbuster movie getting highly paid, with his own driver, dressing trailer and makeup artist. Spencer's dream of becoming an actor is well underway...

OUR PROGRAMS

The KIDS Foundation has been operating since 1993, occupying a unique position as a national leader in childhood safety, and injury and trauma recovery. Our mission is to ensure that all Australian children are safe - free from harm and injury.

This year, in 2023, KIDS Foundation celebrates being 30 years strong.

We work with children who have horrific injuries and trauma from burns, accidents, violent crimes, and abuse, to support them and their families to recover.

In 2020, our education programs reached 400,000 children through 10,000 kindergartens and preschools with an integrated approach to safety, physical and emotional wellbeing.

KIDS Foundation is committed to early intervention, creating, and instilling a health and safety culture that gives young people agency in their learning, critical for lifelong wellbeing.

EDUCATION

Our education programs empower children to build a strong sense of identity and wellbeing so that they can keep themselves and others safe while still allowing them to be kids. Educating children through the SeeMore Safety Program in Australian early childhood education centres is our focus.

RECOVERY (TRAUMA AND INJURY CARE [TIC])

Our TIC programs support children with horrific injuries and trauma caused by burns, accidents, dog attacks, crime, neglect, abuse, and environmental events. We recognise the positive impact of peer support that was promoted through the delivery of Trauma and Injury Care camps, leadership workshops and the National Burn Survivors' Network for families.

ADVOCACY WORK

Our advocacy work gives children a voice and agency in their own learning. We empower them to build self-worth, wellbeing, respectful relationships, values, and behaviours that allow them to become responsible risk takers and contributors to society.

Every day, the team at KIDS Foundation devotes time and resources to educating and empowering children and their families on ways to prevent trauma and injury associated with dangerous situations.

That's how KIDS gets it's acronym -

"Kids In Dangerous Situations"



WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

In Recovery

2022 / 2023 saw KIDS embrace the power of the horse-human connection through the introduction and incorporation of equine assisted activities into our Injury and Trauma Recovery Camps.

Three Camp TANGO's took place during this financial year and were held across three states; Victoria, South Australia, and Queensland. Each TANGO, providing life-changing peer-to-peer connections and experiences for participants.

Our Victorian Camp TANGO's focus was on introducing attendees to the horse-human connection and how powerful it can be. Through equine assisted activities participants gained a new sense of trust and confidence within themselves and their capabilities.

Our South Australian Camp TANGO saw attendees step out of their comfort zones with some fun mental and physical challenges. Everyone worked hard on their team building, communication and problem solving skills whilst in an equine assisted environment.

Our Queensland Camp TANGO involved a number of enjoyable equine inspired activities; including a night out at the Australian Outback Spectacular; 'Heartland'; a meet and greet with world class horse trainer, Cody Rawson; equine assisted activities; and creating horse inspired artwork.











Who we supported - Tianna

Tianna is a burn survivor who was injured in a house fire at 14 months old after her night light ignited in the middle of the night. She first joined KIDS at an Injury Recovery Camp when she was 10 years old, then found KIDS again only a few years ago. In November, 2022 was presented with a specially modified car at Camp TANGO.

Tianna had wanted the independence her own car would bring her for so long and was beyond grateful when she found out that KIDS, alongside her family and other organisations had been working together to make her dream a reality.



WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

In Education

Connecting Generations Hamilton Project - Statistics and Data

in 2022, the Connecting Generations program was implemented across 5 kindergartens and aged care centers in the Hamilton, Victoria area.

As part of this project, an assessment tool called 'CATE' (Children's Attitude Toward the Elderly) was used to consider children's perceptions of the elderly prior to the program delivery, compared to after. Children were shown pictures of an individual at different stages of ageing and responded to tasks and questions based on their understanding and opinions of the elderly

Data showed that:

Children's ability to correctly identify the oldest picture improved across all services by the end of the program

More children were able to correctly order the pictures from youngest to oldest at the end of the program

Children expressed less negative feelings, and increased neutral feelings when thinking about themselves at an elderly age

Children were more aware of the physical and social needs of the elderly at the end of the program



Visit to Coleraine Kindergarten

On the 2nd August, 2022, members of our Education Team, Nick, Hayley, Jo and SeeMore, traveled to Coleraine Kindergarten to see the successful Connecting Generations Program being implemented in partnership with Valley View Nursing Home. Even through the adversities of the Covid-19 Pandemic, these services were able to find a way to come together through the Connecting Generations Program. Each week, the kindergarten read one of the SeeMore Safety books and completed an activity from the KIDS Foundation Connecting Generations Program Guide, before taking a walk to hand deliver their creations and say hello to the residents at Valley View through the windows!



Trailer

Thanks to the generosity of the Jo White Bequest, we were able to design and develop a trailer for the Ballarat and broader regional Victorian community. This trailer will be used to deliver programs that support wellbeing and school readiness and promote the physical and emotional health and safety of children.







YOUR MONEY



Examples of what we do with your money and the support we have provided our young people:

Tom was burnt in a house fire at young age and was later adopted by his foster mum. For 20 years Tom underwent over 150 surgeries and struggled with his partially amputated foot as a result of the fire. Amputation and attachment of a prosthetic lower limb was recommended. This surgery came at a cost, with out-of-pocket fees totalling \$35,000. KIDS raised the money for Tom, who now walks, runs and has taken on a KIDS Youth Leadership role.

Two 18-year-old participants needed cars, however didn't have the ability to fund them. One of the cars had to be less that 5 years old, under than 50,000km, automatic, and could fit a wheelchair to meet the NDIS requirements. These cars cost around \$30,000 - \$35,000 so KIDS Foundation

donated \$2,500 and helped them to fundraise. Within a year both had cars and a new sense of independence. They're now able to socialise with their friends and can transport themselves without the added challenge of public transport.

Camp aids kids' recovery

Survivors of trauma, burns and life-changing injuries converged on Noosa last weekens as part of the Kids in Dangerous Situations (KIDS) Foundation's Together Achieving New Goals and Opportunities (TANGO) Equine

Eighteen young people aged 13 to early 20s and eight mentors travelled from across Australia for a weekend packed with activities and the chance to be and grow together.

After a show on the Gold Coast and an equine centre visit to experience the power of human-horse connection at Eumundi, the group headed to their stay at Ocean Breeze on Hastings Street from where they visited local restaurants, had a dip in the ocean then tested their artistic skills at a Sip and Paint session.

The camp is one of a number of injury re covery programs initiated and managed by the KIDS Foundation which was established 30 years ago by Ballarat and now Noosa resident Dr Susie O'Neill.

"TANGO responds to the transition from teenage years to adulthood which is particularly hard for children affected by injury and burn trauma. Surgery is necessary to help young bodies accommodate growth.

"There are matters of self-image and per-sonal esteem unique to the individual that also arise in these important years. The pro-gram provides a comfortable haven for young survivors to set goals and create their own opportunities," Susie said.

After a couple of chance meetings and interest in his story, Dr O'Neill managed to find him a role in a big budget movie being filmed

In the "up-and-down" charity world, Dr O'Neill said stories such as the young actor were true career highlights in empowering people to realise what could be possible.

We also welcomed Australian freestyle skier and Olympic gold medallist Jakara Anthony OAM to the campaign this vear.


META Activity
